
SESSION 57 – SATURDAY, OCTOBER 23



Zipporah Brown, OTD, OTR/L, CNS, is an assistant professor and academic fieldwork coordinator whose work has focused on the overall wellness of marginalized populations by overcoming occupational deprivation through engagement. She received a master's in occupational therapy in 2016 and Doctorate of Occupational Therapy in 2018. Brown's doctorate focused on increasing quality of life through occupational engagement for individuals with serious mental illness, transitioning from homelessness; additionally, she worked with college students at USC's Faculty Practice using Lifestyle Redesign® to address psychosocial barriers impacting academic success. Her knowledge and training was demonstrated through program development, implementation, and outcome analysis. Brown served as the principal investigator of a research team in 2019 focused on increasing QOL in an urban community. While at USC, she co-founded and was president of the first DEI organization within the OT department; she continues to advocate as a member of the OTAC Ad Hoc DEI Committee and co-chair of the OTAC Student Leadership Committee.

Chu pioneered this program at Rancho for which she created modules, recruited patients, and trialed this approach with the stroke population for her doctoral project.




SESSION 67 - SATURDAY, OCTOBER 23






